


What is Diwali?

In India, Hindus leave the windows and doors of their houses open so that Lakshmi can come in and grant them good fortune.


Lamps are lit to drive away evil spirits and welcome Lakshmi.

Rama and Sita reunite after Sita gets kidnapped, and they began their long journey back to their land. Lamps were lit by everybody to help them on their way and welcome them back.




































Celebrating Diwali


Rangoli are drawn on the floors of the house. These are patterns and the most popular subject is the lotus flower.





Lotus flower










The Meaning of Diwali
